Willie was born January 16,

1934, in Hawkinsville, Ga., to Willie Jerry Brannon and Inez Rebecca Marshall Brannon. At seventeen, he enlisted in the United States Air Force, serving his country in Chattaroy, France. Upon returning to the States, he was able to land a coveted Civil Service position at Eglin AFB, Florida, putting his Air Force skills and experience to use as a Tabulating Machine Operator and then as an IBM Main Frame Digital Computer Systems Operator.

He met the love of his life, Elvia, and they were married on August 23, 1959, in Beebe, Arkansas. They settled in Niceville, Florida. They built a loving home and had their children, Michael and Myra. Jerry continued his federal service in the Panama Canal Zone, arriving in October 1974 as a Supervisory Computer Technician of the Data Processing Division of the Panama Canal Company.
